

DRAMATURGY NOTE

WHILE AN UNDERGRADUATE AT DRAKE UNIVERSITY, Susan Glaspell (1876-1948) worked for the *Des Moines County News* and reported on the suspicious murder of John Hossack. Fifteen years later, after a move to Greenwich



Village (New York), Glaspell used her stories from the Hossack case as inspiration for her first play, *Trifles*. In 1916, Glaspell had helped found the Provincetown Players, a company dedicated to supporting American playwrights, and the other founders (to include George "Jig" Cram Cook) urged that Glaspell's writing make its debut. Although writing from her personal experience with the Hossack case, Glaspell's play is more sympathetic to Margaret Hossack, and the play includes evident criticism that her reporting at the Des Moines Daily News had not allowed.

Two years later, in 1918, Glaspell writes again about the plight of women, focusing on women in society, rather than women at home. *Woman's Honor* is comedic in nature, but does not hesitate to critique the culture of the time. The play predates women having the right to vote, being able to divorce without shame, and the empowerment of working beyond conventional occupations (such as a secretary, nurse, teacher, and stenographer).

Pieces of Glaspell takes place between the 101st anniversary of *Trifles* and the 99th anniversary of *Woman's Honor*. By engaging in these stories from the past we gain important perspectives on these persisting issues women face in our present.—AMANDA GRISSOM'19 AND HALEY WILLITS '18, DRAMATURGS

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TRIFLES WOMAN'S HONOR



Pulitzer Prize winning author Susan Glaspell from Davenport, Iowa, is one of the first feminist playwrights. Pieces of Glaspell focuses on the plight of women at the turn of the 20th century.

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DIRECTOR'S NOTE

WHILE DIRECTING TWO shows at the same time is an exciting challenge, putting two shows into conversation with one another is a unique opportunity. Although *Trifles* and *Woman's Honor* contain similar motifs, they engage them from different perspectives. Pieces of Glaspell presents these perspectives on murder, suspicion, secrets, and female oppression, side-by-side.



In contrast, I see the confining gender roles in *Woman's Honor* as a corset. Women wore corsets in the early 1900s because it was expected of them and viewed as attractive, regardless of the breathtaking restriction they felt. Although corsets were falling out of fashion in the late 1910s, the time in which these plays take place, the women are still constrained by the societal expectations surrounding them.

The women in the plays you are about to see have no right to vote. They are not allowed to serve on juries. If they want to divorce their husbands, they cannot do so without shame and significant loss of financial and societal status. They are expected to perform "woman's work" for their jobs (if they have them) and especially in their homes.

While we live in a very different world today than we did a hundred years ago, the oppression these women faced then speaks to the expectations each of us lives under today. We often do not realize there is more room outside of the basket, more air without the corset.—AMANDA GRISSOM '19," DIRECTOR

Last year more than 1,300 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
