#### THEATRE CURRICULUM

The final project for *Theatre 377: Principles of Directing* is bringing into fruition a full-length play. Accordingly, with this production, each student directed approximately twenty percent of *Proof* by David Auburn. To do so, students drew upon their recent studies in directing, as well as upon previous knowledge of acting, design and tech., script analysis, and dramaturgy.

#### THE PLAY

The play *Proof* examines many strong themes: hereditary brilliance and mental illness; trust, doubt, love, and loss within personal relationships; and women in STEM. Among these themes, we are compelled by *Proof*'s exploration of how quick trust can turn to doubt and how hard it is to regain that trust.

#### INDIVIDUAL NOTES

Dani Lopez: I strongly relate to Catherine and her relationship with Robert, so was very happy to be assigned to the scenes that focus on them. I'm sure the audience, too, will find the character that is the most similar to them, and I hope this makes watching the production more real. Empathy allows for each viewer to have a different perspective of the play. This empathy may even help us when we're in a rut trying to figure out our own problems; at least that's what I hope the audience can take away from this show.

Ryan Bowman: I first worked on David Auburn's *Proof* in 2020 at Carl Sandburg College. The play was my very first acting experience, and it led me to pursue a theatre major at Monmouth College. I did not expect that I'd come back to Auburn's story again, and more so as a director. I hope that the audience finds this play beautifully rendered by young, wonderful actors and first-time directors. We have come together in this production, and exploring this story in a different lens has revealed additional layers. Revisiting Catherine, Hal, Robert and Claire (and working with the actors portraying them) has been wonderful, and I am glad to be retelling this story.

The Buchanan Center for the Art acknowledges support from the Illinois Arts Council Agency Drew Cliffel: While audiences may empathize with one character more than others, I want them to see parts of themselves in all of the characters. Each is relatable in some way. Claire attempts to do what's best for her sister even while not understanding her. Catherine struggles to accept that she is like her father (which might not be as simple as a good or bad thing). Hal has the drive to do what is right for himself and those around him. Robert wants to devote himself fully to the things he loves. Auburn's characters are very human and I want people to connect to them and to the story. Auburn offers an important message about the importance of recognizing how much trusting those around us matters, the need for being able to detect when doubt is creeping in, and the effects a lack of trust has on people.

Zesty Lythgoe: I want the audience to feel like they can root for every single character in *Proof*, not just the protagonist. I think that the best stories have such well-rounded character portrayals that audiences can even find themselves empathizing with the antagonist, occasionally. I am very proud of our casts for their work, which has resulted in my growing love for characters who, at the beginning of this process, I thought of as annoying and toxic. Every actor in this production has given their character an element of charm and vulnerability that highlights the incredibly strong but complex relationships featured within the story. The actors have found the characters' humanity. I encourage the audience to notice the small moments of connection that show why the characters in this play still care deeply about each other, despite the difficulties they have with one another.

Gabbay Madu: Proof by David Auburn has been a part of my academic career since my freshman year. It has been exciting to work on a production that holds different levels of familiarity among the directors. One of us has acted in the play; three of us have worked with it in a classroom setting; one of us has no previous experience with the play. The play's content remains relevant and is relatable to all audiences, as the playwright explores universal themes of love, loss, ambition and psychology—just to name a few. The work done on this production has been thoughtful, as we recognize the message's importance. I hope that audiences are able to find similarities between the characters' lives and their own and find that despite life's trials and difficulties you will always find "proof" of better times to come.
