

RED BARN EAST CELEBRATES TENTH ANNIVERSARY

Vanities and You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown will be the sixteenth and seventeenth productions given by Crimson Masque in the former reading rooms of the old Carnegie Library. The building was vacated on a bitterly cold day in January of 1970 when students, faculty, and staff (several hundred strong) moved the entire book collection into the sparkling new Hewes Library.

After a good deal of discussion the empty second floor space was assigned to the college theatre for experimental theatre, technical workspace, classrooms, and costume and property storage. The Red Barn East (named because it is located to the east of the current Little Theatre or Red Barn) was officially christened in December of 1970 with a production of Brian Friel's Lovers. The show was directed by Lon Helton, a speech and drama major, who was to go on to a successful career in broadcasting in Denver and Chicago.

Monmouth College still faces in the 1980s the challenge of providing a new and integrated theatre arts facility, but the ten-year history of the Red Barn East continues to demonstrate that drama can occur wherever there are dedicated performers, an audience, shared imagination, and an empty space.
