Set in Puritan Massachusetts Bay Colony (Salem), MA in 1692.

Betty Parris: Daughter of Reverend Parris, aged ten.

Reverend Samuel Parris: Town Minister, known to be greedy and judgemental.

Tituba: Reverend Parris' slave from Barbados.

Abigail Williams: Niece of Reverend Parris, orphaned, aged seventeen. A strikingly beautiful girl with an endless capacity for dissembling.

Susanna Wilcott: Friend of Abigail.

Mrs. Ann Putnam: A twisted soul of forty-five, a death-ridden woman, haunted by dreams.

Thomas Putnam: A well-to-do, hard-handed landowner near fifty.

Mercy Lewis: A sly, merciless girl of eighteen.

Mary Warren: Aged seventeen, a subservient, naive girl.

John Proctor: A local farmer, known for his independence and temper.

Rebecca Nurse: Aged seventy-two, a pious soul and well-respected within the community.

Giles Corey: Aged eighty-three, knotted with muscle, canny, inquisitive, and still powerful.

Reverend John Hale: Aged thirty-five, a ruddy, bright young man with an eagerness for knowledge.

Elizabeth Proctor: Wife to John Proctor, sickly yet fervently honest.

Francis Nurse: An elderly pillar to the community.

Ezekial Cheever: The town's clerk.

John Willard/Hopkins: The residing deputy, a drunkard.

Judge Hathorne: Local judge, aged sixty-five.

Deputy-Governor Danforth: A grave man in his sixties, of some humor and sophistication that does not, however interfere with an exact loyalty to his position and his cause.

Sarah Good: Homeless, has lost her mind due to the perils of the time.

Martha Corey: Third wife to Giles Corey.

<u>Synopsis</u>

Widely regarded as one of the greatest American plays of all time, *The Crucible* was originally written as a parable of 1950's McCarthyism. As with the alleged witches of Salem, suspected Communists were encouraged to confess and identify other Communist sympathizers as means of escaping punishment. Many of those accused of Communism suffered loss of employment and/or destruction of their careers; some even suffered imprisonment. Miller's ideas resonate in the embattled world of today's political contexts with strong polarization between the ideologies of parties regarding religious freedom, social policies and fear of the unknown.
